1:30 p.m. The Next Four Years



Kay Ivey is the Lieutenant Governor-Elect of the State of Alabama. A Camden native and a 1967 graduate of Auburn University, Ivey began her career as a high school teacher before becoming an officer with Merchants National Bank in Mobile. She also served as an assistant hospital administrator as well as Assistant Director of the Alabama Development Office where she authored the "Prepared Cities" Program. Ivey also served as a Reading Clerk for the Alabama House of Representatives. In 2002, Ivey was elected State Treasurer and was re-elected in 2006.

2:00 p.m. Keynote Address: Remember My People

Rick Bragg is the author of the critically acclaimed and best-selling *All Over but the Shoutin*' along with five other books and was a Pulitzer Prize-winning national correspondent for the *New York Times*. Bragg says he learned to tell stories by listening to the masters, the people of the foothills of the Appalachians. They talked of the sadness, poverty, cruelty, kindness, hope, hopelessness, faith, anger and joy of their everyday lives, and painted pictures on the very haze of the early evening, when work faded into story-telling.



Bragg is currently a Professor of Writing in the Journalism Department at the University of Alabama.

3:30 p.m. Redistricting: The 2010 Census



Catherine McCully is with the Census Redistricting Data Office in the U.S. Department of Commerce. The office provides states the opportunity to specify the small geographic areas that they wish to receive 2010 decennial census population totals for the purpose of reapportionment and redistricting. The program will provide states the opportunity to delineate voting and state legislative districts and to suggest census block boundaries.

John Tanner is a former Visiting Fellow of the Alabama Law Institute and the former Chief of the Voting Section of the Justice Department's Civil Rights Division. Tanner has taught election-related courses at the University of Alabama Honors College and Cumberland Law School. Tanner is the author of *Informal Guide to Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act* and *An Informal Guide to Redistricting*.

Andy Andrews, who resides in Baldwin County, is an internationally known speaker and novelist whose combined works have sold millions of copies worldwide. 1:30 p.m. National Healthcare Reform: Alabama's Choices

LaVeeda Battle is an attorney in Birmingham, Alabama. Battle has 30 years of broad experience representing public and private clients in complex legal matters. She has served as counsel to the Senate Judiciary Committee and the House Banking Committee. Battle has become a leading expert on issues relating to National Healthcare Reform and has written and spoken on the topic extensively.



2:00 p.m. Changes in Washington: Eisenhower to Obama



John Cochran currently serves as Senior Washington Correspondent for ABC News. Cochran joined the network in January 1994 as chief Capitol Hill correspondent, where he reported on the historic change of leadership as Republicans took control of the House and Senate for the first time in four decades. He also covered Bob Dole's unsuccessful bid for the presidency in 1996. He was the senior White House correspondent in the final two years of the Clinton administration until January 2001 when he took on his current assignment as senior Washington correspondent.

Cochran joined ABC from NBC, where he spent 21 years as a correspondent in Washington and overseas. For five of those years, he was NBC's chief correspondent to the White House.

Cochran has received three Emmy awards for his reporting: the first in 1981 for his coverage of the threat to Communism from the Solidarity movement in Poland, the second for his anchoring of reports during the overthrow of the Communist regime in Romania in 1989, and the third for his part in ABC News coverage of the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001. He also received the Peabody and Alfred I. DuPont awards for his role in ABC News coverage of the attacks.

A native of Montgomery, John Cochran began his journalism career while at the University of Alabama.
